

Truterra® Registered Carbon Program with Indigo

COMMON PRACTICE COUNTIES

The **Truterra® registered carbon program with Indigo** requires that eligible farmers adopt at least one **core practice** in CY2025 in each enrolled field. In the counties listed below, specific core practices may be considered common based on county-level practice adoption rates and are therefore not eligible on their own. In these scenarios, a **supplementary practice** or an alternate core practice is required in addition to the common core practice.

Climate Action Reserve (CAR) is the registry that will issue credits generated by this program. CAR defines a “common practice” threshold as >50% adoption of a practice on the total cropland acres in a given county, based on USDA/NASS data. CAR common practice exclusions prohibit an otherwise eligible practice from being counted as “additional” due to a greater than 50% adoption in a given county, regardless of crop type. However, if that practice is adopted with another qualifying additional practice, the field may generate carbon credits for both stacked practices. Example: A field in Jefferson County, Nebraska adopts no-till for the first time in CY2025. No-till is considered a common practice in this county, so the field must *also* adopt another core or supplementary practice to be eligible for the program. A supplementary practice could be stacked on top of no-till adoption, or the farmer could consider adopting an alternate core practice:

Core practice options (other than strip/no-till)	Supplementary practice options
<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Addition of cover crops• Addition of a legume species to an existing cover crop mix	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Longer cover crop duration• Addition of a new eligible cash crop to the rotation• Enhanced nitrogen management (use an approved nitrification inhibitor or slow-release fertilizer product, reduced number of nitrogen applications, or improve nitrogen application method.)

The best way to determine a field’s eligibility for this program is to enter the field boundary and complete the profiling and post-profiling data in the Truterra® MyPortal enrollment platform.
